NOTE: The District cannot accept responsibility for sizes and/or the viability of plant materials as stated by the nursery. All planting material requires commitment to assure survival. Putting plants under stress (i.e. lack of water, planting too deep or too shallow, or a delay in planting) will weaken the plants and lessen survival rates. Do not plant larger trees too close to buildings, sidewalks, driveways or utilities. It is your responsibility to learn proper planting techniques and to select appropriate planting sites. The District cannot be responsible for replacing stock that do not survive.

DESCRIPTIONS

Although these plants are for conservation purposes only and shall not be used as ornamentals or for landscaping (SWCD Act), landowners living in urban areas are encouraged to plant these species as they can provide wildlife habitats, shade, windbreaks, or erosion control.

TREES & SHRUBS

Whitespire Birch: Rapid growing pyramidal deciduous broadleaf tree. Turns golden yellow in fall, bark becomes white as tree matures, borer resistant. H: 30-40' W: 20-25'

Prairie Fire Crabapple: Medium growing rounded deciduous broadleaf tree. Dark rosy flowers in spring, flowers are red in bud stage, disease resistant - purplish new foliage becomes reddish-green - persistent dark red fruit. H:15-20' W: 15-20'

Red Sunset Maple: Medium growing upright/oval deciduous broadleaf tree. Great maroon foliage all summer, more upright and compact than Crimson King. H: 30-35' W: 20-25'

Bur Oak: Medium growing rounded deciduous broadleaf tree turns golden yellow in fall, large stately landscape specimen, large leaves. H: 50-100' W: 34-45'

Northern Red Oak: Medium sized. Grows at a moderate-to-fast rate. Durable and long lived. Prefers full sun. H:50-75' W: 50-75'

White Oak: Large deciduous tree that grows best in rich, moist, acidic, well-drained soil in full sun. Dark green leaves turn to a range of brown to red in fall. H: 50-80' W: 50-80'

American Redbud: Medium growing rounded deciduous broadleaf tree. Good fall colors, purplish pink flowers in early spring, blooms prior to leafing, attractive heart shaped leaves. H: 15-25' W: 10-20'

Concolor Fir: Narrow conical conifer that grows best in rich, medium moisture, slightly acidic, sandy, well-drained soils in full sun to part shade. Soft, flattened, pale blue-green needles. H: 40-70' W: 20-30'

Eastern White Pine: Grows in average, medium, well-drained soil in full sun. Prefers full sun, fertile soils and cool, humid climates. Rapid growing, long-lived, needled evergreen. H:50-80' W:20-40'

Colorado Blue Spruce: Grows in average, acidic, medium moisture, well-drained soils in full sun. Tolerates some light shade. Medium to large, narrow, pyramidal conifer. H:30-60' W:10-20'

Norway Spruce: Large, evergreen coniferous tree. Prized for blue-green needles color and excellent landscape form. H:50-125' W:20-45'

Black Chokeberry: Slow growing spreading deciduous broadleaf shrub. White flowers in spring, black berries in fall. Tolerates most soil conditions. H: 2-3' W: 2-3'

Bailey's Red Twig Dogwood: Medium growing upright deciduous broadleaf shrub. Cream cluster flowers in spring, white to bluish berries in late summer, brilliant red twigs glow in winter. H: 5-6' W: 5-6'

Nannyberry: Rapid growing mounding deciduous broadleaf shrub, white flowers in mid spring, black berries in mid fall, good wildlife plantings. H: 15-18' W: 6-10'

American Hazelnut: slow growing rounded deciduous broadleaf shrub good fall colors, fragrant white flowers in spring, brown nut in fall

Black-eyed Susan: Golden yellow perennial native wildflower, grows to 24" tall. Great for pollinators.
