DESCRIPTIONS

Although these plants are for conservation purposes only and shall not be used as ornamentals or for landscaping (SWCD Act), landowners living in urban areas are encouraged to plant these species as they can provide wildlife habitats, shade, windbreaks, or erosion control.

TREES & SHRUBS

American Redbud: Medium growing rounded deciduous broadleaf tree. Good fall colors, purplish pink flowers in early spring. H:15-25' W:10-20' Full sun to partial shade.

Autumn Blaze Maple: Rapid growing pyramidal shaped tree. Dazzling red fall color. Adaptable to most soils. Cross between red & silver. H: 50-60' W: 30-40' Full sun.

Celebration Maple: Rapid growing oval shaped tree. Turns burgundy red with tinges of burnt orange in fall, very hardy and adaptable to most soils, less susceptible to frost cracking than other maples. Seedless. H: 50-60' W: 30-40' Full sun.

White Oak: Slow growing rounded deciduous. Good fall colors, open branching habit. Illinois official state tree. H: 60-90' W: 40-60' Full sun.

Bur Oak: Medium growing rounded deciduous. Turns golden yellow in fall, large stately landscape specimen. H:50-100' W: 34-45' Full sun.

Eastern White Pine: Grows in average, medium, well-drained soil in full sun. Prefers full sun, fertile soils and cool, humid climates. Rapid growing, long-lived, needled evergreen. H:50-80' W:20-40'

Colorado Blue Spruce: Grows in average, acidic, medium moisture, well-drained soils in full sun. Tolerates some light shade. Medium to large, narrow, pyramidal conifer. H:30-60' W:10-20'

Norway Spruce: Large, evergreen coniferous tree. Prized for blue-green needles color and excellent landscape form. H:50-125' W:20-45'

Bailey's Red Osier Dogwood: Prefers organically rich, medium to wet soils. Leaves change from green to red/orange and eventually purple in autumn. Stems turn bright red in winter. Tiny, fragrant, white flowers in late spring. Fruit ripens in summer and is attractive to birds. H: 5-6' W: 5-6' Full sun to partial shade.

Lilac– Common Purple: Medium growing vase-like deciduous broadleaf shrub. Fragrant lilac flowers in late spring. H: 6-12' W: 6-12' Full sun.

American Hornbeam: Medium growing rounded deciduous tree. Green leaves turn yellow to orange in the fall. Interesting blue-gray bark. H:20-25' W:15-20'

Kentucky Coffeetree: Slow growing upright deciduous tree. Huge doubly compound leaves turn yellow in fall. Hardy and pest free. H: 50-60' W: 40-50'
